

What was VE day?



VE day was Victory in Europe Day.

It happened on 8th May 1945.

This was the day when Germany surrendered (gave up) the war and the Allies (like official friends) won.

The Allies were Britain, France, Russia and the USA.




What is VE day 75?



The 8th May 2020 marks **75 years** since VE day.

It's a day to *remember* all those who fought and died.

And all those who worked at home to keep the country going.



75 years is a long time ago...



It is a long time ago, but take a look at the numbers:

WW2 lasted **2176** days

430,000British people were killed

50-55million *civilians* (ordinary people) were killed

70-85million people died across the world

377,000 British were wounded



16 people who went to our school lost their lives.



Tenacity


Hitler got his planes to bomb British cities. He hoped he would make

British people want to give up. This was called The Blitz.

- 2million houses were bombed.
- 32,000 civilians (ordinary people) were killed
- 87,000 civilians were wounded.

The British people refused to give up.

Their **tenacity** was called the 'Blitz spirit'.




A man from Hadfield remembers...

"I can remember walking from **Woolley Bridge** towards **Brookfield** with my Aunty Mary, it was **Christmas Eve 1944.**

Coming up behind Mottram Church, there was a lot of black smoke. This was the day when Foulkes' Farm was hit by a bomb. Farmer Foulkes used to deliver milk to Aunty

Mary's but didn't come that day.

We never saw a bomb dropped in Hadfield, but they used to test the sirens once a month and they frightened me to death."

Hard Work




With many men away fighting, women had to take over their jobs. Their hard work kept the country running. For example the Women's Land Army worked on farms.

This was a *small* step towards equality.

A week's rations





Independence



To escape bombing in **The Blitz** 1.5million children were **evacuated**. They went to the countryside. They had to become more **independent**.

600 hundred children came to **Glossop**. They came from a place called **Lowestoft**. They lived with local families.

The war inspired people to invent new things. Like Alan Turing and a machine called Enigma. The Germans sent secret codes about attacks. This machine broke the codes. So lots of lives were saved.

The Enigma machine was the word's first digital

computer.

Excellence





WW2 brought out the best in people. Like the Prime Minister Winston Churchill. He is famous for helping us win the war.



Other people showed excellence too. **Douglas Bader** was a pilot. He lost his legs in a plane crash in 1931.

Yet he joined the air force in WW2. He fought in the **Battle of Britain**. This battle stopped the Germans invading Britain.



VE day was not the end...



The war was over in **Europe**. But it was still being fought against **Japan**.

The war ended when America dropped the first nuclear bombs on Japan. Japan surrendered and victory over Japan was celebrated on 15th August 1945. This was called **VJ Day.**



- Millions were dead or injured
- Millions of buildings had to be rebuilt
- Food rationing did not end until <u>1954</u>


Fast forward to 2020

Let's see how....




We need tenacity to help us get through lock down.

Is the end in sight?


VE day was not the end of the war.
